Dear friends in Christ,

Alleluia! Christ is risen. It is with these words that we begin the celebration of the resurrection of our Lord and savior Christ Jesus. The response back is; He is risen indeed. Alleluia! Those are very powerful and meaningful words for the faithful to share. They are, to be sure, words that the world neither understands nor even wishes to hear. They are also so easily spoken and yet, mostly misunderstood by the faithful. So let us dig into them as we enter the season of Resurrection.

The first declaration comes from the worship leader or out of the mouth of the one who is calling to others to speak of faith. That word, alleluia, is really shouted as it rolls from the deepest recesses of the believers spirit. It is a shout of pure joy and excitement, that one gets to make upon experiencing the risen Christ. It is in coming face to face with the risen Christ that alleluia is shouted. "Alleluia! God be praised", why?

Because he raised Christ Jesus for the dead. This event may have happened over 2000 years ago, but that work of God

is ongoing today as well. It wasn't a one and done for God, no it's an everyday, every moment event of God's steadfast love. When that word is shouted in worship it is the faith of the one voicing those words which shines through. Faith that God, who not only raised Jesus in that garden, still today raises he in the presence of the gathered faithful. That phrase invites your voice to join the chorus which transcends time and space to praise God for the unfolding of the resurrection in your presence and for your sake.

It is the response of the faithful which becomes the moment of resurrection for everyone who shouts in reply. The response of, He is risen indeed! Is not just a formula for worship. No it is a deeper, personal and eternal claim by the faithful. When one replies with, He is risen indeed! It is not a statement of historical reality or mere formula for worship. No it is a claim that one is making for and about themselves.

He is risen indeed! Is the claim that I, the one who relies, acknowledges that Christ is risen *IN* me. That is the moment when Jesus becomes embodied in me and as Paul would later

state, it is no longer I who lives, but Jesus who lives in me. It is this counter-cultural claim that the world neither understands nor wishes to hear. When you, the faithful children of God, make this bold and other-worldly claim you are declaring to the world that your life belongs not to you but to the one who died for you.

The ruler of this world does not like that because you and your life exists as a living reminder that he has lost. He thought that he, through his earthly disciples, had killed Jesus ending his power and reign, but you are declaring that to be false.

GRACE

In the early 1800's the territories of Ohio and Michigan both claimed jurisdiction over the strip of land between them stretching west from the mouth of the Maumee River at the west end of Lake Erie to what is now Indiana. Shipping of beaver pelts, lumber and minerals including iron ore and copper, on the Great Lakes was growing rapidly at that time and that piece of land would provide access for the forestry and agricultural regions of Michigan to Great Lakes shipping through the port city of Toledo. The situation came to a head when Michigan petitioned for statehood in 1835 and sought to include the disputed territory within its boundaries. As a result, the two territories actually mobilized their militias and confronted each other across the Maumee River near Toledo. Insults were exchanged, much taunting ensued, and many shots were fired, apparently into the air. One officer, somehow stabbed in the leg, was the only known casualty of what became known as the "Toledo War". It was later reported that he recovered fully. At this point the U.S. Congress stepped in and resolved the issue by awarding the disputed

strip of land, known as the Toledo Strip, to Ohio, and taking ownership of what we now know as the Upper Peninsula from the territory of Wisconsin and awarding it to Michigan. It is not recorded anywhere that I could find how Wisconsin viewed that decision. However, competition and resentment between the two territories continued for many years, even after becoming states, and eventually became especially intense between the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor and later when Ohio State University was established in Columbus in 1870. Athletic and scholastic competition between the two universities continued relentlessly, and the first Ohio State - Michigan football game was played in 1897, making that rivalry one of the oldest and what is widely considered to be the most intense football rivalries of all. That rivalry escalated even more drastically in the 1970's during the legendary "Ten Year War" between University of Michigan head coach Bo Schembechler and Ohio State University head coach Woody Hayes. To this day the Head Football Coach at each of those two schools is hired with three very specific priorities; #1, *beat that other team*; #2, *beat that other team*; #3, *beat that*

other team, and also, win the Big 10.

Ok, by now you are almost certainly wondering where I am going with all of this, if in fact I haven't already just completely lost you. But, here's the thing. About two weeks ago as you read this, the long time Running Back Coach at Ohio State, Tony Alford, suddenly and unexpectedly resigned from Ohio State and assumed the running back coaching position at Michigan! Talk about a shocker. You can't imagine the confusion, outrage, and traitorous Benedict Arnold name calling that flared up from Ohio State fans all over their social media sites and to a somewhat milder extent in the Ohio sports media. Undoubtedly there was a lot of private talk among the team members and the rest of the coaching staff, but publicly they were all silent until Ohio State star running back TreVeyon Henderson X'd a message for his former Coach Alford:

"So thankful that God allowed us to cross paths Coach. God's got you, Coach, Love You!"

Whoa! We don't often, never actually, look to college athletes,

or any prominent public figure for that matter, to reach out and demonstrate that kind of grace and love, especially to someone who has apparently just betrayed them. By all accounts, TreVeyon is a fine dedicated young man, who is a credit to his family, his school and his Christian faith. Especially notable is the fact that Coach Alford personally recruited TreVeyon to come to Ohio State. As running back coach, he trained TreVeyon to become the highly respected football athlete that he is, and so was instrumental in preparing TreVeyon for his potential professional future.

There's a lesson here, if not for all of us, then at least for me. If TreVeyon can demonstrate that kind of quiet, gentle, loving grace in the face of such a seeming betrayal, then the least I can do is to follow that example, to resolve the anger, frustration and resentment that flare up in me on regular, all-to-frequent occasions and replace them with the Christian Love that I am actually commanded by Jesus to practice in John 13:34:

"A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another; even as I have loved you, that you also love one another."

There's not a lot of wriggle room here. I have struggled with these issues for a very long time, but for some reason

this particular grace-filled response from TreVeyon, a prominent participant in arguably that most violent of all college sports, really spoke to me. Perhaps it was partly because as a life-long Ohio State fan that I initially felt some of that anger and confusion regarding Coach Alford's decision before I read TreVeyon's message, and then it struck home to me how much I need to change.

The thing is, we never know how God will choose to get our attention to speak to us, and so I am reminded in one of my favorite scripture passages, I Kings 19:11-12:

*"And he said, "Go forth, and stand upon the mount before the Lord." And behold, the Lord passed by, and a great and strong wind rent the mountains, and broke in pieces the rocks before the Lord, **but the Lord was not in the wind;** and after the wind an earthquake, **but the Lord was not in the earthquake;**¹² and after the earthquake a fire, **but the Lord was not in the fire;** and after the fire a still small voice.*

As my brother Joel wrote just before his death, "Pay attention (or you will miss what God is doing)!"

And finally, Peace to all and a Blessed Holy Week as we prepare to celebrate God's Amazing Grace-Filled Easter, Hap

April 2024 – From Sheep to Shepherd: An LSI Early Childhood Services Story

Amid the COVID-19 pandemic, a mother, recently released from treatment, found herself in her new empty apartment with her son. She felt lost and needed a shepherd to guide her. So, Hali contacted LSI's Early Childhood Services, and Gretchen O'Brien, a Family Support Worker, answered the call. Gretchen began virtual home visits using the Healthy Family America home-visiting model.

For the next three years, Gretchen connected Hali and her son to community resources, served as a support system and a shoulder to cry on, and celebrated Hali's sobriety milestones with her. Even when Hali doubted herself, Gretchen guided and believed in her.

"I just remember sitting in that empty apartment crying, but I had Gretchen on the phone. You guys believed in me when nobody else did," shared Hali.

Today, Hali serves on the Healthy Family America

(HFA) National Parent Advisory Committee, the first of its kind. The group is composed of 10-12 parents from around the country who have graduated from their local HFA program, each participant with their own story to share.

Hali needed a shepherd in her time of trouble and self-doubt, and Gretchen answered that call. Now, Hali serves as a shepherd to thousands of parents through the National Parent Advisory Committee. The LSI Early Childhood team couldn't be more proud of Hali and Gretchen.

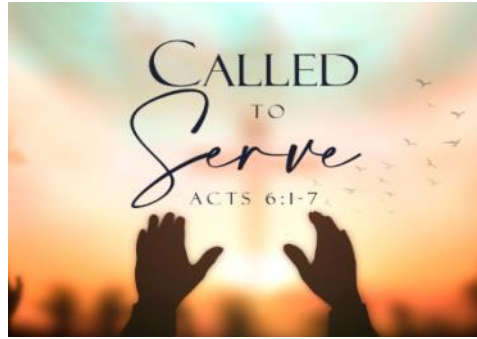
Hi all-

Wednesday Wonders



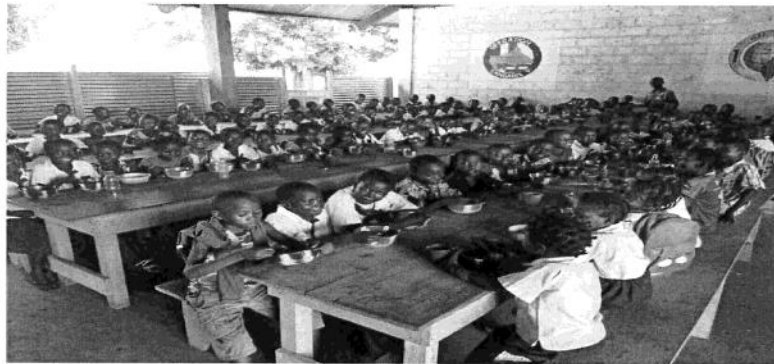
Wednesday Wonders will meet Wednesday, April 17, 2024 in the Fellowship Hall at 9:30 am.

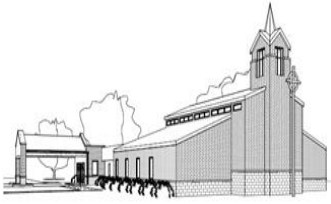

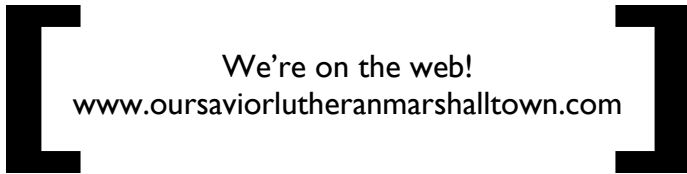
