Brothers and sisters in Christ, grace to you and peace,

One of the things I am want to do as I drive on a long trip is to read as many bumper stickers as I possibly can. Sometimes if the speed is just right and the car in front of me is travelling straight I can read the sticker on the bumper. Other times when I've stopped for fuel or food there will be cars with stickers for me to stop and read. I do so enjoy the ingenuity and humor that can be found on those small pieces of plastic and paper. What is more interesting to me is how many people view their car's bumper as their billboard to announce their personal life philosophy. What is interesting when you think about it is the notion that with a few trite words are able to express the fullness of one's thoughts concerning their life.

We are in another election cycle in our country, an off year election, and a busy one at that. There are already bumper stickers appearing for various candidates which allow supporters to declare their desire to see that person elected. Have you ever noticed how many of those bumpers stickers are red, white and blue in color? Just by look-

ing at bumpers you are to be able to make an educated guess as to which party the person belongs to, what issues are important to them and how they would engage you in a conversation about life.

You know, we in the church don't have bumper stickers that our Lord invites us to place upon the bumpers of our cars. Instead, our Lord invites us to dress in, and embody certain unchangeable characteristics, attitudes and behaviors. The Lord is not at all interested in what the bumper sticker on your car reads; he's only interested in you; how you live this life that he has breathed into you.

The bottom line is simply this; you are the living 'bumper sticker' of the Lord's will and wish for this world. For the sake of this world and all that the Lord God has created you are invited to hear this and then live it out. "As God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, meekness, and patience. Bear with one another and, if anyone has a complaint against another, forgive each other; just as the Lord has forgiven you, so you also must forgive." (Colossians 3:12)

What Paul writes as inspired by the Holy Spirit of the Lord is way too long for a bumper sticker, even on a semi-tractor. It is, however, already written into your being and is ever in front of you as it is the word of the Lord. While these verses are far too long to serve as a personal statement, or philosophy on a bumper sticker, they fit your life perfectly.

"Now is the winter of our discontent . . ."

Shakespeare's play, "Richard III", opens with Richard of Gloucester describing the re-accession of his brother, Edward IV, Duke of York, to the throne of England:

"Now is the winter of our discontent Made glorious summer by this sun (or son) of York; And all the clouds that lowered upon our house In the deep bosom of the ocean buried."

These often quoted and just as often misquoted opening lines from Shakespeare's 2nd longest play seem strangely appropriate today, even though we are actually nearing the end of what has surely been a summer of great discontent. Every issue that arises seems to stir up such strong political, sociological, racial, ideological or just basic angry emotional reactions that it seems public displays of violent protests or riots could break out at any moment. Events such as the recent Supreme Court ruling on abortion and the Department of Justice's investigation into Donald Trump's possible violation of Federal law have caused deeply divisive emotional reactions all across the political spectrum. I have made it an intentional practice not to address political issues in my articles, but it is

becoming increasingly difficult or even impossible to keep religious and political issues separated these days. Please understand that I have no intention of stirring up any kind of politically divisive feelings and will totally understand if anyone is not interested in what I'm going to address this month. If you wish, just feel free to jump to the Quote of the Month and Peace at the end of this article. Having said that, I state that I am a life-long Republican and have voted straight Republican as long as I can remember voting, but my party seems to have left me and wandered off into some strange Never-Land of a personality cult and inability to accept any reality that doesn't fit its weird new vengeful, angry political ideology. And then there is the rising specter of Christian nationalism that I referred to in my July newsletter article and which seems to be gaining support, particularly with the extremist right-wing of the Republican party. I have been following this issue for a while with increasing concern, but may go into it in more detail another time.

But, here's the thing. I was sharing some of my concerns with Joe and Felicia last Sunday morning during Fellowship, and they were both understanding and even a bit sympathetic, I think, of some of them. Felicia noted that while she understands my concern with some

of the issues, she also reminded me that there is no point in worrying about those things over which we have no control. She is completely correct of course, and I know that, but I seemed to have recently lost some perspective and I really needed to be reminded of that simple fact by someone else. Thank you, Felicia, for helping me to get my priorities back in order!

If God is truly in control, and I do believe that He is, then He will work things out according to His will, with, or more likely, without my help, and there is no reason for me to worry about the outcomes of any of these issues, as I had forgotten but need to be constantly reminded in Romans 13:1:

"Let every person be subject to the governing authorities, for there is no authority except from God, and those authorities that exist have been instituted by God."

So, I will continue to lift up my country, all of its citizens and all of our governmental, political, military, and social leaders, in prayer every day. I will continue to exercise my civic responsibility to vote as intelligently as possible and to support issues and decisions that I understand to be best

Back to School Month

School is right around the corner! This time of year can be exciting and stressful for many of us, but adjusting back into a classroom routine can be especially difficult for kids and teens with emotional or behavioral disorders.

Lutheran Services in Iowa (LSI) provides mental and behavioral health services for children and families across the state. Our therapists provide virtual and in-person therapy sessions with children, while our Behavioral Health Intervention Services (BHIS) team collaborates with families in their home to help them develop skills like anger management and healthy decision making. LSI also provides 24-hour mental health care at our Bremwood Residential Treatment Center in Waverly to empower Iowa children and teens.

Support for the Long Run

Part of LSI's mission is to ensure hundreds of Iowa children and families have access to quality mental health care, parenting education, and crisis services.

On our Bremwood Residential Treatment Center campus in Waverly, staff are able to provide 24/7 behavioral health care and encouragement for children and teens like N. During her time on campus, N. and her team of therapists and professionals worked on developing coping skills that could help her manage her anger on the difficult days and take space for

herself when she felt overwhelmed.

She was able to participate in Spiritual Life, a voluntary faith-based program offered on campus. N. says the program helped her learn important lessons about forgiveness and trust through reading passages of scripture. She says the biggest lesson she has learned is that "when you make a mistake, there are ways to fix it."

N. is now looking ahead and has goals for her future. She is working on graduating high school, and she is excited to get her driver's license. She wants to become a special education teacher and empower the next generation, and she wants her story to inspire other kids who could benefit from the same care she received through LSI.

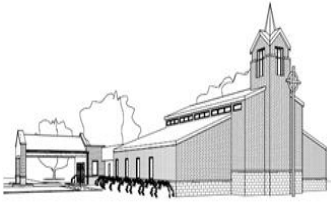
